STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Creative Village Arts is an incorporated charitable company limited by guarantee and registered with HMRC as a charity from 20 June 2012. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The directors of the company are also the trustees for the purpose of charity law. The charity has 3 directors, who constitute the full formal membership of the company, and are the primary volunteers in its activities. The directors convene regular meetings and adhere to the Articles.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The activities are based around the charitable aims of providing resources (both physical and intellectual) to the local community in the area of visual arts. The activities of note in the reported year are detailed below.

1. Refurbishment of Pump Street Studios

The refurbishment of the property was completed in April 2013, on budget and within the schedule required by the ACNI, and using the Central Procurement Directorate as requested.

The final phase of refurbishment has been the moving in, snagging and correction and preparation of the financial transactions relating to the 5% retention of funds that was agreed for the initial year.

It has taken some time to complete the snagging issues, even though they were all fairly small-door locks, sink fitting repair, some paintwork etc. There have been some queries over the final use of contingency funds, however we anticipate that before the end of 2014 all finances will have been wrapped up re the actual building of the art studios.

2. Set and running of studio activities

The Derry Print Workshop is now well established as our resident artists. DPS has approximately 16 fully subscribed members and is flourishing.

The studios have been well occupied with 3 'permanent' artists and several part-time artists.

The group studio has been a great success catering for classes in painting, life drawing, crochet, knitting, iconography, ceramics, millinery, modelling-it has even been used as a photographic studio.

4. London Street Gallery

Our ongoing involvement with the London Street Gallery has been a great success. We have completed the project and published studies on numbers and attendance. In total the Gallery in the City of Culture Year attracted approximately 10,000 visitors, hosted 14 exhibitions, and welcomed visitors such as President Michael Higgins. We have also boosted the profile of visual arts in the city with numerous radio, television and newspaper coverage, both national and local.

5. Artist Support

As part of our primary aims we have provided business and marketing support to numerous artists including assisting in organising websites and applications for tenders and provision of free meeting spaces for artist groups.

6. Local art initiative support

We have supplied free of charge advisor support to several local art initiatives. These include a Fashion and Textiles research project for Inner City Trust, artists talks at London Street Gallery, and providing meeting space for groups such as Open Door 77 for exhibition planning and activities.

- Pump St Studios redeveloped, occupied and fully functional;
- 1 (b) Promoting, organising and publicising events which improve public access to, and participation in, arts and crafts;
- 1 (c) Providing facilities for exhibitions workshops and seminars;
- 1 (d) Providing non-formal, creative education in a range of creative disciplines;
- 1 (e) Encouraging interest in, raising awareness of and fostering the development of creative projects;
- 2. Provide opportunities and facilities for artists and craftspeople to collaborate, offer mutual support, engage in critical debate and share ideas and help advance their professional development;
- 3. Promote co-operation and partnership working between arts and cultural organisations, community groups, public and statutory bodies and agencies, and others to facilitate the development of the creative industries sector and so provide employment and training opportunities and enable artists and craftspeople to be gainfully employed in creative activities;
- 4. Promote artistic activity within communities of the area, including those that suffer economic and social disadvantage, so as to encourage a view of the arts as a medium of information, expression, and advancement.

Running London Street Gallery that has shown work of over 350 local artists and attracting over 10,000 visitors.

London Street Gallery planned, kitted out and in constant use for art and artist support activities.

Workshops and classes conducted in group studio.

Strong web presence advertising opportunities; facebook site thriving and active in local campaigning for gallery and artist support.

Group studio used by several groups for interaction and education;

Gallery has hosted community, school, special needs groups as part of its operations. Pump Street has been volunteered to groups such as Inner City Trust to host ministerial visits and to social groups for exhibitions and workshops.

Organisation based and running with open access to communities recognised as disadvantaged such as the Diamond and the Fountain areas of Derry~Londonderry

2013-14 has, in the opinion of the Directors, been an extremely successful year, emphasised by the successful management of budget and the ability to sustain the organisation

financially, and build interest and membership.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Creative Village Arts is very close to running at break-even point without any subsidy or grant from any source other than the Culture Company grant 2012-13. We are actively engaging with Arts Council Northern Ireland and Derry City Council to seek future support that would bring us in line with other bodoes in Belfast etc. This is ongoing, however its seems liklely that in 2014-15 it will be possible to again break-even due to rental and group studio use-considering we rent out the spaces at very favourable rates we consider this is a satisfactory position for the charity.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Following on from the success of the City of Culture, the primary goal for the forthcoming year is the consolodation of our achievements. We aim to ensure that the organisation is on secure footing going forward, especially in the light of difficulties facing the funding of Arts in the near future.

Ensuring the security and stability of the existing studios and the Derry Print Workshop will be of primary importance.

In line with our charitable aims we will seek to assist both individual artists and groups with issues of space, exhibitions and expertise wherever possible. We will aim to submit or assist with at least one application to the City of Culture Legacy Fund. We will most likely see the continuation of the No Jury No Prize exhibition that we ran with Dr Rory Harron in 2013.

We will be improving and refining processes, with the hope that in the coming year we will be included on the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland Register. This is somewhat in the hands of the Commission as they work through their large backlog of organisations.

We will continue to be a major contributor to the NIAC/DCC Visual Arts Strategy, primarily with the aim of raising the profile of under investment in studios and the visual artistic community in the North West.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations gifts and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognised when there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when: - the donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or - the donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Income from charitable activities includes income received under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions is recognised as earned as the related goods or services are provided. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support performance activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Fund accounting

The charity has a number of restricted income funds to account for situations where a donor requires that a donation must be spent on a particular purpose or where funds have been raised for a specific purpose.

All other funds are unrestricted income funds.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates. Contractual arrangements and performance related grants are recognised as goods or services are supplied.

- Charitable activities include revenue expenditure associated with providing resources to the local community in the area of visual arts.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Items with a value of less than £100 are not capitalised.
